Accessibility Guidelines/Suggestions

Accessibility guidelines within website development is not an exact science. While there are recommended guidelines, there is not a published standard that is a requirement of any governing body. With that in mind, we suggest utilizing the guidelines outlined in the WAG 2.0 recommendations. That includes the following:

- 1. Use colors that provide contrast to the site user.
- 2. Do not use color as the only means of communication.
- 3. Install an optional software plugin that allows for keyboard navigation and easy accessibility. Many times these plugins also assist site users to:
 - a. Have the page read to them
 - b. Change the contrast of the site
 - c. Highlight links
 - d. Change the text size
 - e. Increase the spacing between the text
 - f. Stop animations
 - g. Select more legible fonts.
- 4. Provided ways for the user to control the automation of image sliders and videos (as noted above, the software plugin also assists with this).
- 5. Where appropriate, provide meaningful text alternatives to non-text elements like images.
- 6. Seek to avoid or limit the use of idioms, jargon, abbreviations, etc.
- 7. Use clear content at an appropriate reading level (8th grade target).
- 8. Use standard headings, subheadings, and lists appropriately.
- 9. Be intentional about indicating which text is linked (the software plugin noted above also assists with this).
